Retail businesses are limited to five customers for each 1,000 square feet, are to maintain social distancing and provide shopping cart sanitation supplies. Childcare facilities are to adhere to KDHE guidelines for daycares, perform enhanced cleanings daily and screen works and children for fever and COVID-19 symptoms. For personal services, service providers and customers must wear masks, appointments must be spaced to allow for cleaning and only one customer per service provider is allowed at a time. Organized sports facilities, games and practices are allowed if mass gathering and social distancing requirements are met, as well as if guidance established by the Kansas Recreation and Park Association is followed. Bars and night clubs can open at 50 percent capacity, are subject to mass gathering and social distance guidelines and consumer-facing workers must wear masks. For childcare and summer camps, parents and caregivers cannot enter the facility, except during pickup and drop off times. For sports and athletic activities, no more than 2000 total participants or 50 percent capacity (whichever is smaller), social distancing rules apply. For mass events: limited to no more than 2000 or 50 percent of capacity (whichever is smaller), social distancing and mass gathering requirements apply, crowd sizes cannot exceed 45 individuals.
