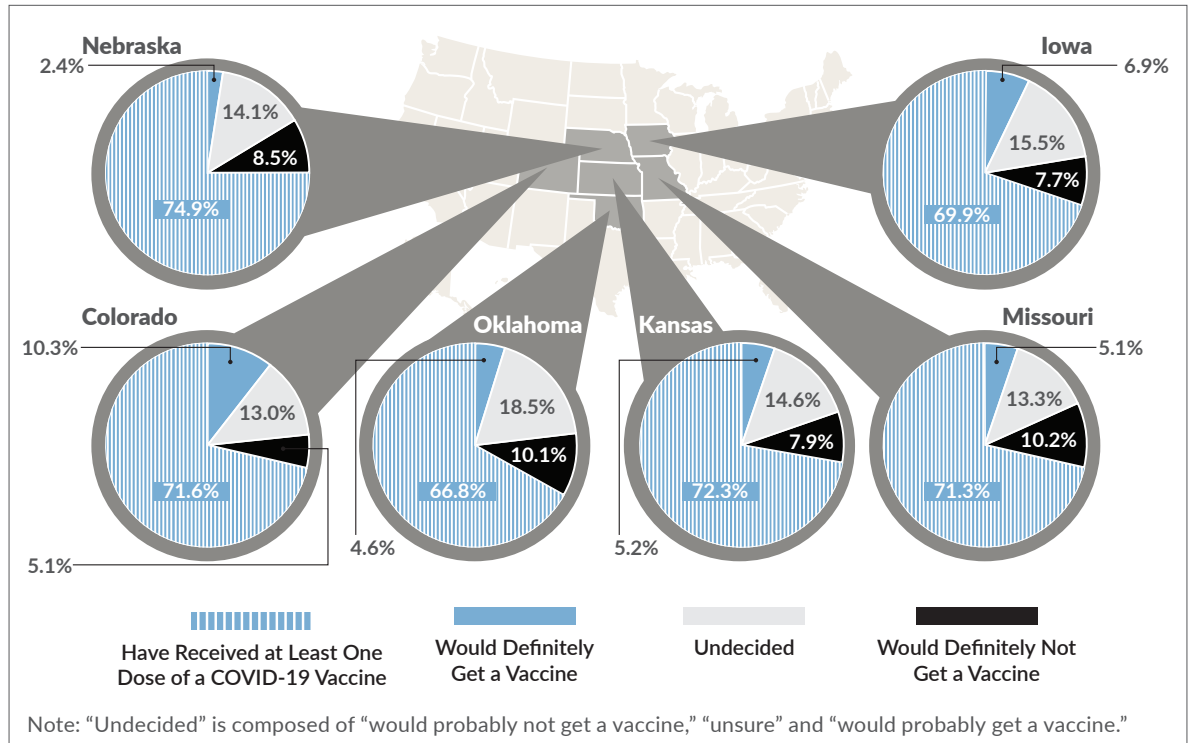


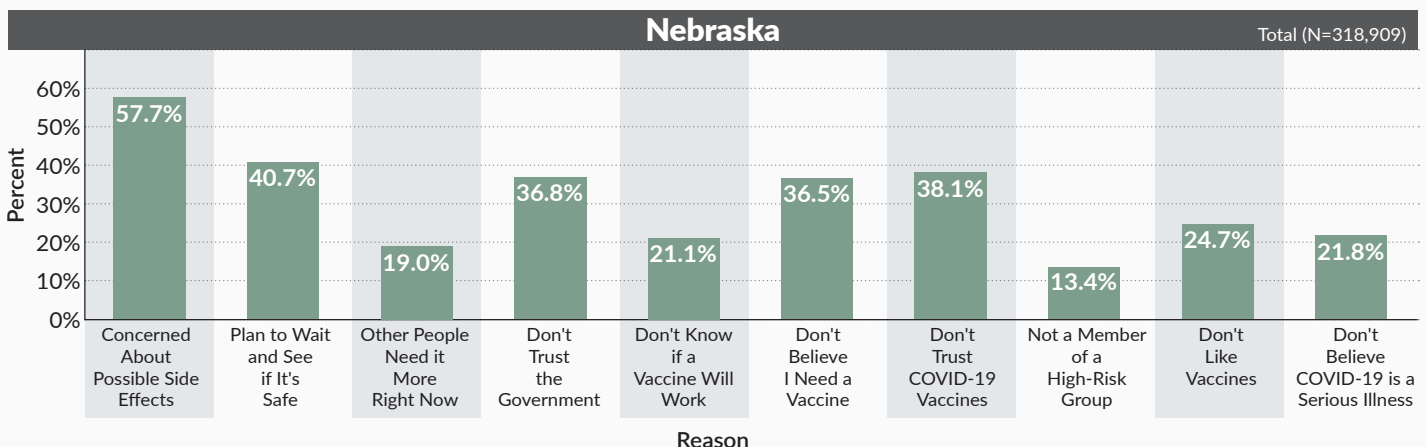
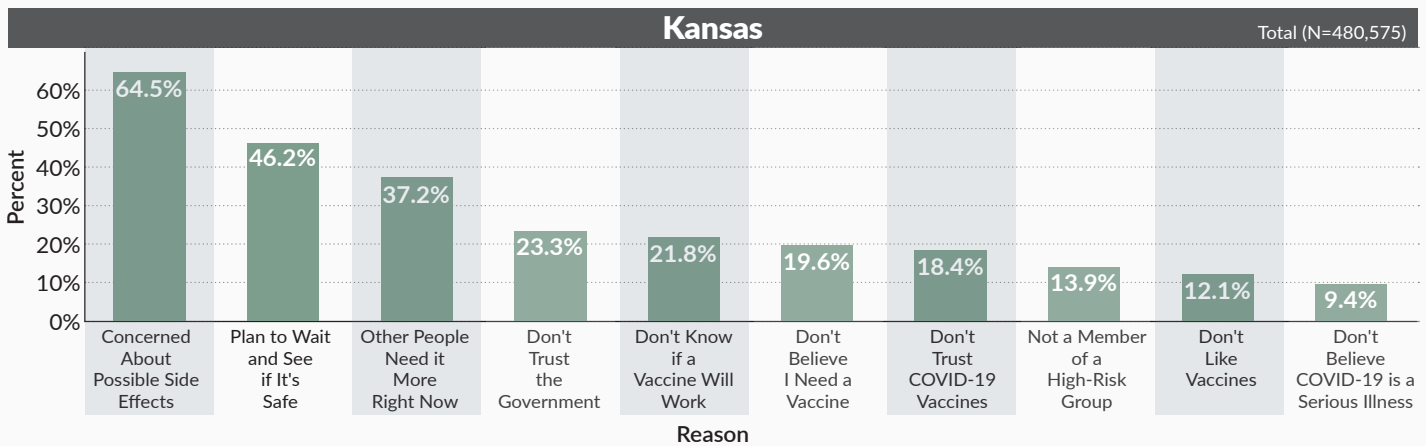
# COVID-19 Vaccine Intent Across Neighboring States

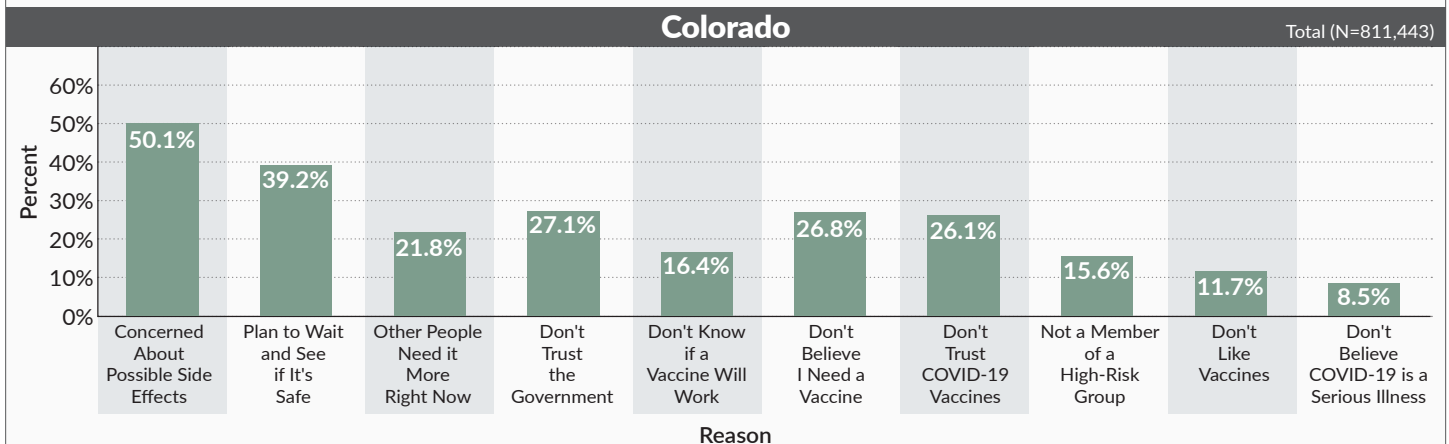
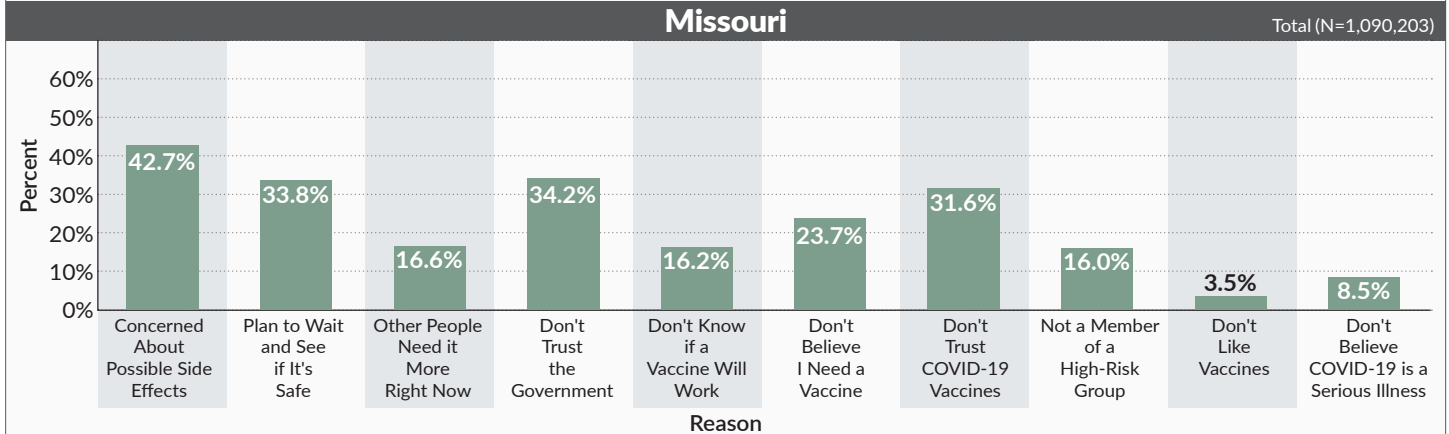
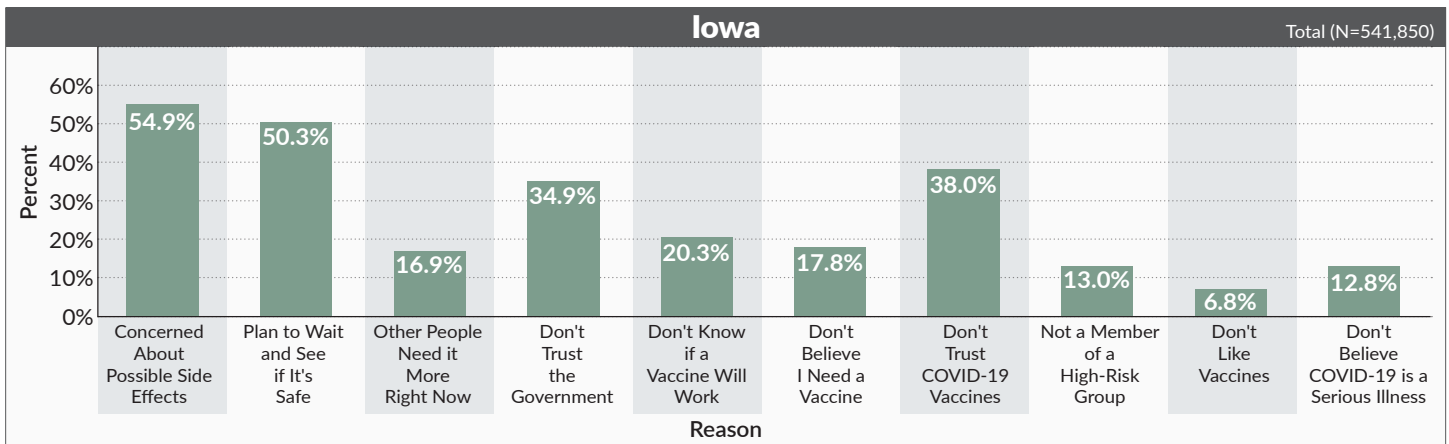

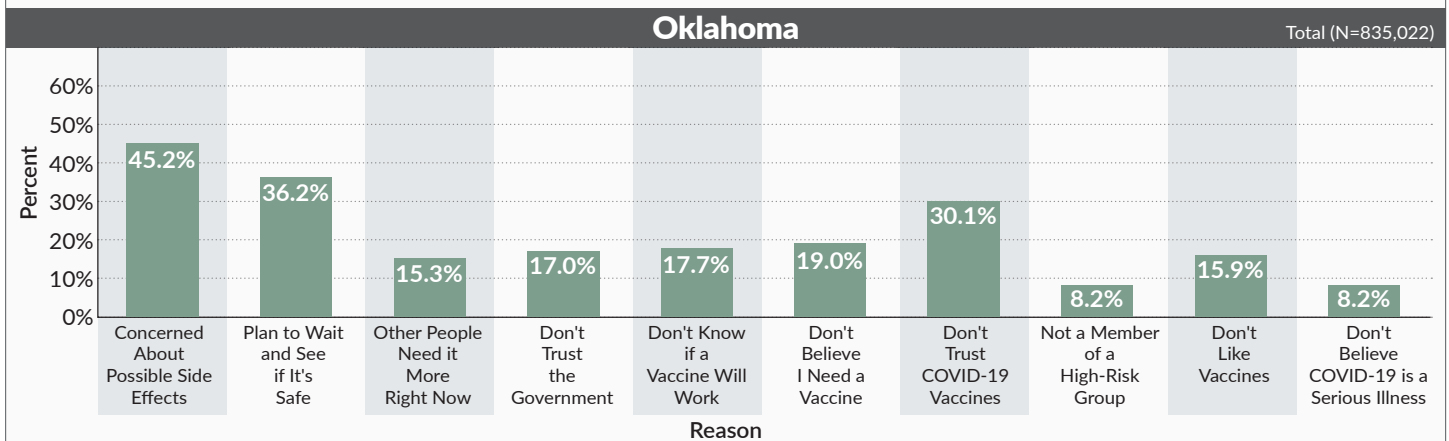
This figure shows reasons given by those "uncertain" about getting the vaccine, including those who are "undecided" and "would definitely not get a vaccine."



Note: In Nebraska, "Doctor Has Not Recommended It" is among the top 10 reasons but not listed here.



Note: In Colorado, "Already Had COVID-19" is among the top 10 reasons but not listed here.



Note: Respondents could choose more than one reason, so the total is more than 100.0 percent. Uncertain includes those who are "undecided" and "would definitely not get a vaccine."
