# KEYNOTE - HELPING KIDS QUIT: OPPORTUNITIES AND BARRIERS FOR YOUTH TOBACCO CESSATION



Brenna VanFrank, M.D., M.S.P.H. is the senior medical officer in the Office on Smoking and Health (OSH) at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). She is responsible for providing input on the medical aspects of OSH's scientific research and communications and serves as a scientific and medical consultant for OSH programs and projects. Dr. VanFrank joined CDC in 2014 as an Epidemic Intelligence Service officer and has worked on a variety of public health topics including tobacco prevention and control, nutrition and obesity, and emergency preparedness and response. She has particular interest in the integration of healthcare and public health and the use of epidemiologic data for public health action. Dr. VanFrank is board certified in pediatrics and preventive medicine and is a member of the national Delta Omega Honorary Society in public health.

Jody Hoener is the President and CEO of The Healthy Bourbon County Action Team and serves as the regional coordinator for the southeast Kansas KUMC COPE program. As the leader of the Healthy Bourbon County Action Team, she has learned lessons as well as seen much success in gaining needed resources and community support for initiatives focused on addressing the social determinants of health. Living in a rural community has afforded her the opportunity to learn about building a culture of health through policy, systems, and environmental change. Her work has been recognized with the prestigious Kansas State Wellness Community Champion Award, identified by the Kansas Hospital Association and Kansas Health Institute as a leader in the field and used in a toolbox for Kansas hospitals as an example of best practice approaches to address community health. She is passionate about addressing health outcomes, enhancing quality of life and encouraging economic growth. Outside of work, she enjoys spending time outdoors with her

two teenage daughters and traveling as much as possible!



*Vince Nacarrato* is beginning his 30th year in education, and his 17th year as principal at Reno Valley Middle School in Hutchinson, KS. He served six years on the Kansas Association of Middle School Administrators Board of Directors. Reno Valley Middle School was featured in Mary Kay Ricci's book, Create a Growth Mindset School, for their efforts in fostering growth mindsets with students. Last year, Reno Valley participated in the ECHO pilot and has used that experience to foster a culture to prevent tobacco use, as well as to support students who are using tobacco.

Amanda Olinger, D.O., M.A., F.A.A.P. serves as the pediatric hospitalist at the University of Kansas Health System, Marillac Campus as well as the site director of pediatric services at this facility. Her team provides well-rounded medical services for children and adolescents admitted for acute psychiatric crisis. She serves on the KU Marillac leadership team as well as a consulting member of the KU Hospital Ethics committee and the Marillac Employee Engagement committee. Dr. Olinger represents the Kansas Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics as the E-cigarette Chapter Champion. Each state has a representative to work towards providing up to date information, education and interventions to our members, community, patients, and families. She went to medical school at Kansas City University after obtaining a master's in bioethics. Dr. Olinger completed her pediatric residency at KU and was honored to be offered a position in

the general pediatric department as a hospitalist following residency. KU pediatrics is not only her work home, but her family and she plans to continue to develop robust medical services for KU's inpatient pediatric psychiatric facility in collaboration with the General Pediatrics department.



Officer Tony Woollen has had a long and impressive career in law enforcement. He began in 1992 and was the first School Resource Officer in Leawood, KS, overseeing two Blue Valley School District junior high schools. He founded the Kansas Association of School Resource Officers. ### PRESENTATION - SHIFTING MINDSET: COLLABORATIVE AND ACTION-ORIENTED APPROACHES TO ADDRESS TOBACCO IN SCHOOLS



*Dr. Eleanor Leavens, Ph.D.* is an Assistant Professor within the University of Kansas School of Medicine Department of Population Health. Her research focuses broadly on the assessment of tobacco regulatory policies and the impact on tobacco-related health inequities. Her research investigates products such as electronic cigarettes, heat-not-burn devices, and hookah smoking and evaluates the impact on vulnerable populations. Trained as a clinical psychologist, she specializes in the treatment of health behaviors including tobacco/nicotine use, sleep problems, and substance use using brief, evidence-based interventions. She is particularly interested in increasing access to such interventions. She serves as chair of the Cessation and Discipline subcommittee of the Kansas Vaping Taskforce.



**Bryce Chitanavong** is the Youth Tobacco Prevention Coordinator at the Kansas Department of Health and Environment and is currently pursuing his Master's in Business Administration. Bryce is a lifelong Kansan who has previous work experience in the healthcare field.
