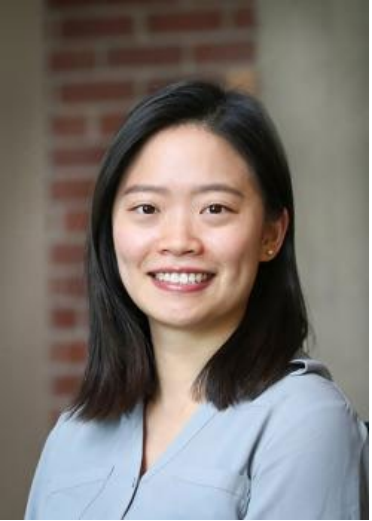

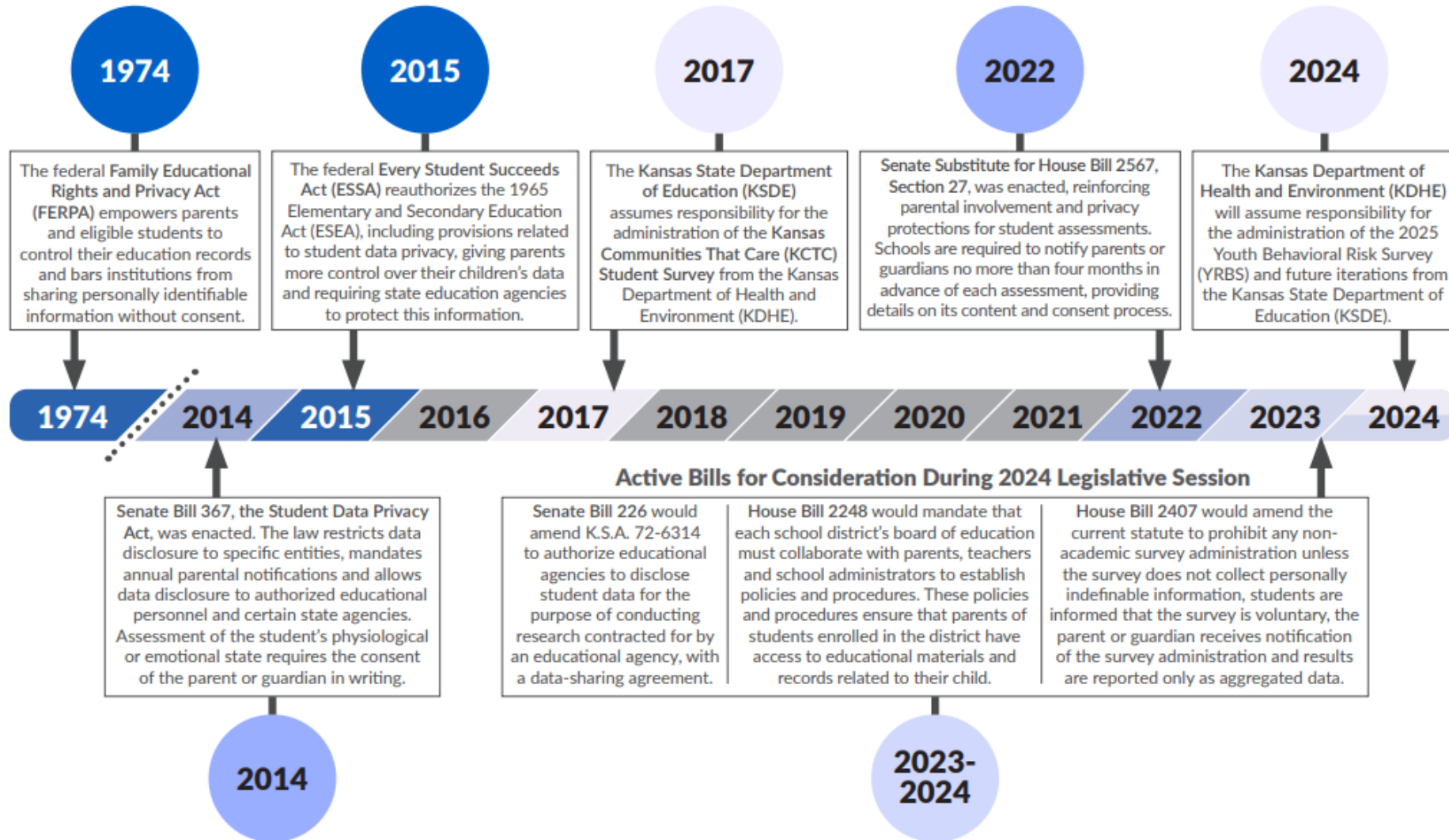

Kansas Youth Data Overview

Primary Data Collection

Survey: This research method gathers information from a sample of individuals or groups within a population. Surveys are designed to collect data on various aspects such as behaviors, attitudes, demographics, or health-related issues. They can be conducted through questionnaires, interviews or other data collection methods to understand population patterns, trends or characteristics.

Primary Data Collection: This refers to gathering original data directly from the source or population being studied through methods like surveys, interviews, observations, or experiments. Primary data collection allows researchers to tailor questions or methods to specific research objectives and obtain information unavailable elsewhere.



Kansas Youth Data Overview

Administrative and Secondary Data

Kansas Information for Communities (KIC)

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment hosts this website to facilitate access to population statistics, vital statistics (e.g., pregnancy, birth and death), hospital emergency department and discharge data and cancer statistics. These are large administrative data sets based on reported data (essentially the entire population).



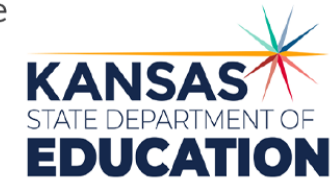
Kids Count

The Kansas KIDS COUNT project is a joint effort of the Annie E. Casey Foundation and Kansas Action for Children. They publish annual snapshots of how Kansas children age 0 to 17 are doing compared to their peers based on a compilation of secondary data on a wide-range of topics. Topics covered include economic security, education, and health. Fact sheets are available at the statewide and county level with local, state and national comparisons.



KSDE Data Central

The Kansas State Department of Education (KSDE) maintains a Data Central website with numerous sets of K-12 education-related administrative data including: attendance, graduation rates, dropout rates, headcount enrollment, IDEA and gifted students, personnel data, free or reduced-price lunch data, suspension and expulsion data, and school related crime data. The site also includes links to Federal data sources such as National Assessment of Education Progress (NAEP) and the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES).



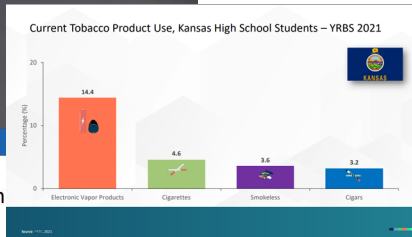

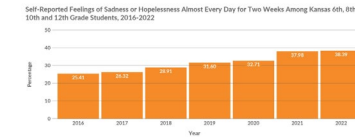

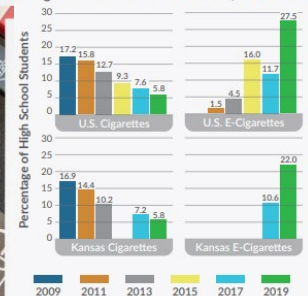
Youth and outlet density and consumption:

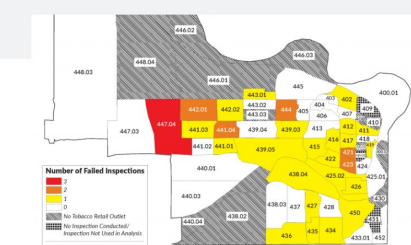
Figure 1. Percentage of High School Students Who Currently Smoke Cigarettes or Use E-Cigarettes in the U.S. and Kansas, 2009-2019

Further, adolescents and young adults may identify certain retailers who will sell tobacco products to them while underage. The latest data is from the 2013 Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS), which found that 10.8 percent of Kansas high school students reported obtaining their own cigarettes by buying them in a store such as a convenience store, supermarket, discount store or gas station.²⁹ National data from the 2017 YRBS found that 13.6 percent of U.S. high school students who currently use electronic vapor products bought them in a store. In 2017, YRBS changed its question from obtaining cigarettes to obtaining electronic vapor products.
